

Early NJ Black Newspapers & Publications

The Landscape Newspaper Editor, publisher and printer **Alfred P. Smith** founded the monthly periodical in 1880.








William Rock was the publisher of The Echo Press, a c1904 Black owned newspaper - first established in Long Branch and then moved to Red Bank.



Among the first African American newspapers to have been published in the state of New Jersey was Trenton's *The Sentinel*, established in 1880.



(1877-1960) inspired T. Thomas Fortune to move to Red Bank. Summersett operated a printing business and printed The Mail in 1904.






City News (c1983) - was founded in Plainfield, and later relocated to Newark. The weekly newspaper was published by Henry and Jan Johnson.

Shaping Black Identity (Ida B. Wells Gallery)

Ida B. Wells was the first Black investigative reporter, who tirelessly worked to record data about Black people lynched across the United States. She worked with T. Thomas Fortune at his newspaper, The New York Age, to continue her anti-lynching work, when her newspaper was burned down in Memphis, Tennessee, by the Klu Klux Klan. She was posthumously awarded a Pulitzer Prize for her work. Wells was also a great leader of the Women's Suffragist Movement.

Champions of Humanity from Ida B. Wells to Bryan Stevenson



A marker that honors Samuel "Mingo" Jack Johnson was installed at Wampum Lake in Eatontown in collaboration with The Equal Justice Initiative (EJI), founded by Bryan Stevenson and the NJ Social Justice Remembrance Coalition (NJSJRC).
